ABOUT THE GALLERY – ABOUT OUR TEAM

The National Gallery is one of Australia's leading visual arts institutions. The Gallery is based in Canberra and is a vital part of the Australian cultural landscape. OVERVIEW OF THE ROLE

The National Gallery is seeking a scholar with expertise in Pacific Arts to join an enthusiastic team who work within a vibrant and rewarding environment stewarding and developing the National Gallery's relationship with art and artists.

Reporting to the Senior Curator, Asian and Pacific Art, this role provides support with the planning and coordination of activities related to the Pacific Arts collection, programs and departmental projects. This includes assisting with the research, development and management of allocated parts of the collection and exhibition projects.

The Artistic Programs Portfolio is responsible for the care, loan and presentation of the national collection along with the initiation, development and delivery of the exhibition, touring, publishing and commissioning program at the National Gallery. The International Art Department is responsible for researching and delivering loan exhibitions, commissioning projects for the program, as well as researching, building, interpreting, and publishing on the National Gallery's collection and preparing collection displays.

The Pacific Arts collection at the NGA was established in 1968 to present the arts of Australia's closest neighbours in the Pacific. The group of over 2000 works from the region comprises traditional and contemporary Pacific Arts, including stone, wood and fibre sculptures, masks, textiles, and the largest collection of contemporary prints from Papua New Guinea in Australia.

The position is a non-ongoing full-time role for a period of 5 months.

SKILLS AND CAPABILITY - OUR IDEAL CANDIDATE

Our ideal candidate will have a demonstrated broad knowledge and understanding of the visual cultures of Pacific Islander societies with a degree in art history or a relevant discipline. Ideally the candidate will possess skills in and knowledge of curatorial museum practices and procedures, including the display of works of art and the organisation of exhibitions.

Proven administrative skills with the ability to work on several projects simultaneously, organising and prioritising to meet specified deadlines with a minimum of supervision are essential. Evidence of effective skills in written and oral communication with experience in public speaking, understanding of cultural protocols and demonstrated expertise in undertaking research and publishing material on relevant aspects of Pacific Arts are required.

Demonstrated skills in the maintenance of accurate records in manual and computer-based formats and an awareness of museum cataloguing methods and collection management software are desirable as are effective interpersonal skills with the ability to work effectively as a member in a team and establish good working relationships with multi-disciplined staff teams and Gallery clients. An ability to promote and apply the principles of workplace diversity and participative management practices is also desirable.

THE KEY DUTIES OF THE POSITION - WHAT WILL YOU DO?

In accordance with the APS 6 Work Level standards, and working to the Senior Curator, Asian and Pacific Art, you will:

- Assist with the organisation of exhibitions and displays within the Asian and Pacific Art exhibition program. Assist with the identification, research, cataloguing and collection management aspects of the collection.
- Oversee the movement of works of Pacific Arts for the purposes of exhibition, conservation, photography and storage.
