THE POSITION

The Education Manager leads the National Gallery's creative learning programs for students and teachers across Australia, encompassing early learning, primary, secondary, and tertiary programs and teacher professional learning. As part of the National Gallery's commitment to engaging learning audiences across the country with the National Collection, learning programs are delivered onsite, online and offsite supporting national engagement and touring exhibitions.

The Education Manager, together with the Assistant Director of Learning and Digital and the Head of National Learning, drives the Gallery's creative learning pedagogy, practice, evaluation and research for student and teacher engagement, extending reach and impact.

Working with the First Nations Lead Artist Educator and First Nations Learning Facilitator, and in consultation with colleagues in the Gallery's First Nations Engagement team, the Education Manager promotes learning programs and resources that elevate the voices of First Nations artists and build knowledge and understanding of First Nations arts practice, cultures and perspectives.

In 2022, the National Gallery will launch a National Digital Learning Program, engaging students and teachers across the country with the National Collection through innovative digital learning programs and resources. The Education Manager will work closely with the Digital Learning Manager in the ongoing development of this program.

The Education Manager also leads the delivery of the National Visual Art Education Conference, Australia's only national conference for visual art educators.

This position of Education Manager is an ongoing fulltime role within our Learning and Digital Portfolio.

You will have demonstrated skills and experience to extend the reach and impact of learning programs, having engaged new audiences through your commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion.

You have excellent leadership and collaboration skills with strong communication skills. You have proven experience in successful project management with strong attention to detail and a commitment to meeting project timelines.

You understand and have an awareness of evaluation processes with a commitment to reflective practice. You have demonstrated experience in supporting and implementing change management processes.

You will have Tertiary qualifications in visual art/art history and education or relevant experience leading learning programs in an arts organisation.

WHAT WILL YOU DO

In accordance with the APS Executive level 1 work level standards, and reporting to the Head of National Learning, you will have the following key responsibilities:

- Lead the development and delivery of the National Gallery's learning program for students and teachers, onsite, online and in support of our touring exhibition program.
- Drive the National Gallery's creative learning pedagogy and practice.
- Lead a team of part-time Artist Educators, casual Artist Educators and Learning Facilitators.
- In collaboration with the First Nations Artist Educator, First Nations Learning Facilitator, and First Nations Engagement team, you will prioritise and elevate First Nations artists and arts practices through learning programs and resources.
- Drive the development of the National Gallery's National Digital Learning Program to ensure students and teachers across the country are able to access and engage with their national art collection.
- Oversee the day-to-day operations of the National Gallery's learning program, including bookings processes, marketing and audience development, risk management and budgets.
- Lead evaluation and research that contributes to deeper understandings about the impact and effectiveness of learning programs.
- Build and maintain strong working relationships with external stakeholders and education networks nationally.
- Lead the delivery of the National Visual Art Education Conference (biennial).
